WECC August 2025 Meeting (First 90 minutes)
Tue, Aug 5, 2025

Summary:

The discussion began with Paul Hancock addressing technical difficulties related to audio connectivity, particularly with Cynthia, and confirming the attendance status of members. He noted several apologies from absent members, including James, who was traveling, and highlighted the use of AI in generating the minutes from the previous meeting. A correction was made regarding the date of a walking meeting, which was confirmed to be in June, leading to the approval of the minutes.

Hancock provided updates on various community issues, starting with the status of self-funding public toilets, which faced delays due to the absence of key individuals. He emphasized the ongoing legal disputes involving the council and the need for evidence related to public urination during events. The conversation then shifted to the challenges surrounding bin hubs, where a lack of communication about their placement was noted, alongside concerns about traffic speed in residential areas that necessitated re-canvassing.

Traffic management strategies were a significant focus, with Hancock discussing the importance of visual ambiguity in road design to enhance safety. He proposed modifications to road layouts, including build-outs and changes to parking configurations, to help slow down traffic. The issue of tourist bus parking and idling in Edinburgh was also addressed, with a call for a comprehensive coach parking strategy to clarify regulations and improve enforcement, particularly in light of recent changes around Charlotte Square.

Further topics included the state of public plantings, financial updates regarding the Hugo account, and the status of public sculptures, including maintenance issues with a granite sculpture outside the Tron. Hancock raised concerns about gully maintenance in Rosebury Crescent, which had not been addressed for over a year, and discussed the upcoming operator charging scheme, expressing worries about its complexity and the lack of preparation time for local businesses. James Benbow contributed an update on licensing, highlighting new applications and the need for better access to licensing data.

Technical Difficulties and Meeting Updates

Paul Hancock opened the meeting by resolving technical difficulties with Cynthia's audio. He acknowledged the absence of several members, including James, who was traveling, and confirmed that the minutes from the previous meeting were generated using AI. A correction was noted regarding the date of a walking meeting, which should have been in June instead of July.

Public Toilets and Community Concerns

Paul Hancock addressed the delay in discussions about self-funding public toilets due to Andy's leave. Paul Hancock addressed the incomplete installation of bin hubs and the confusion surrounding their locations, noting that some streets would be re-canvassed. He also raised concerns about traffic speeds in residential areas, emphasizing the need for speed monitoring to ensure safety.

Traffic Management Strategies

Paul Hancock highlighted the need for effective traffic management through design changes that create visual ambiguity. He mentioned specific examples, such as Douglas Crescent, where altering sight lines and road widths could influence driver behavior. Hancock argued that removing white lines could lead to slower traffic speeds, as drivers would be more cautious without clear guidance.



Discussion on Tourist Bus Parking and Idling Issues

Paul Hancock raised concerns about the parking and idling of tourist buses in Edinburgh, emphasizing the need for a clear strategy and enforcement measures. He mentioned the difficulties in identifying appropriate parking locations and the impact of current regulations on both tourists and residents. Isabel Thom contributed by discussing the implications of recent changes to traffic regulations around Charlotte Square.

Discussion on Local Environmental and Planning Issues

Paul Hancock addressed several local environmental issues, including the presence of dead trees and the poor condition of grass areas that were supposed to be re-turfed. He expressed frustration over objections to a balcony at a garage and highlighted concerns about short-term rentals potentially disrupting the community. Hancock noted that the planning policies have changed, affecting local housing dynamics.

Financial Updates and Licensing Board Report

Paul Hancock reported on the financial situation, highlighting the existence of a Hugo account with £914. He detailed the monthly costs for a new website and email service, which will enhance communication for officers. Additionally, he touched on the City Council's licensing board report regarding the over-provisioned policy, noting its limited effectiveness in practice.

Discussion on Public Sculptures and Installations

Paul Hancock addressed concerns regarding the granite sculpture outside the Tron, noting its broken water feature and the public's mixed feelings about its location. He recounted the story of a lion sculpture that was moved to St. Andrew's Square and expressed skepticism about the need for additional sculptures. Hancock also mentioned a desire to place a new statue in Athol Crescent Gardens, highlighting the availability of water supply for potential installations.

Gully Maintenance Issues in Rosebury Crescent

Paul Hancock expressed frustration over the lack of action regarding a gully in Rosebury Crescent that has been on the cleaning list for over a year. He noted that both he and Scottish Water Contractors have reported the issue, yet it remains unresolved. The discussion revealed broader concerns about the effectiveness of gully inspections and cleaning methodologies.

Discussion on New Operator Charging Scheme

Paul Hancock raised issues about the new operator charging scheme, emphasizing that operators lack clear guidelines on how to calculate charges due to the delayed release of scheme details. He criticized the Scottish Government's approach, which he believes complicates the process unnecessarily. Hancock also mentioned efforts to advocate for a delay in implementation to allow businesses adequate time to adjust.

Licensing Updates and Database Improvements

James Benbow reported on a new takeaway restaurant license and several short-term let applications, noting the lack of detailed information available. Paul Hancock emphasized the importance of enhancing the licensing database to streamline processes and reduce the burden on staff. They discussed the potential for a more efficient system that could provide better access to information.

- * Paul Hancock will raise the issue of the new scheme guidelines at the next council meeting in August.
- * Paul Hancock will ask about the possibility of sorting the licensing database to allow James Benbow access to the application forms.
